

Prophet & Pan-African Visionary Marcus Garvey 1887-1940



Born Marcus Mosiah Garvey, Jr. August 17, 1887 in Saint Ann's Bay, Jamaica and died June 10, 1940 at age 52 in London, England, UK. He was a Jamaican political leader, publisher, journalist, entrepreneur, and orator who was a staunch proponent of Black Nationalism and the Pan-Africanism movement, to which end he founded the Universal Negro Improvement Association and African Communities League (UNIA-ACL). He founded the Black Star Line, which promoted the return of the African diaspora to their ancestral lands. Garvey's father had a large library, and it was from his father that Marcus gained his love for reading. He attended elementary schools in St. Ann's Bay during his youth. While attending those schools, Garvey first began to experience racism. In 1907, he took

part in an unsuccessful printer's strike and the experience kindled in him a passion for political activism. In 1910, Garvey left Jamaica and began traveling throughout the Central American region.

Over time, Marcus Garvey became influenced by many civil rights activist of his time. He ultimately combined the nationalist ideas of other Pan African and Booker T. Washington. This was accomplished with the political possibilities and urban style of men and women living outside of plantation and colonial societies. After years of working in the Caribbean, Garvey left Jamaica to live in London from 1912 to 1914, where he attended Birkbeck College, taking classes in law and philosophy. He also worked for the African Times and Orient Review, published by Dusé Mohamed Ali, who was a considerable influence on the young man. Garvey sometimes spoke at Hyde Park's Speakers' Corner.

In 1914, Garvey returned to Jamaica, where he organized the UNIA. "I should name the organization the Universal Negro Improvement Association and African Communities (Imperial) League. Such a name I thought would embrace the purpose of all black humanity." Thus to the world a name was born, a movement created, and a man became known.

On May 9, 1916, he held his first public lecture in New York City at St Mark's Church in-the-Bowery and undertook a 38-state speaking tour. The next year in May 1917, Garvey and thirteen others formed the first UNIA –ACL division outside Jamaica. They began advancing ideas to promote social, political, and economic freedom for black people.

The Legacy of Marcus Garvey 1887-1940

Garvey worked to develop a program to improve the conditions of ethnic Africans "at home and abroad," under UNIA auspices. On August 17, 1918, he began publishing the Negro World newspaper in New York, which was widely distributed. He used *The Negro World* as a platform for his views to encourage growth of the UNIA. By June 1919, the membership of the organization had grown to over two million. By August 1920, the UNIA claimed over four million members. That month, the International Convention of the UNIA was held. With delegates from all over the world attending, 25,000 people filled Madison Square Garden on August 1,1920 to hear Garvey speak. Over the next couple of years, Garvey's movement was able to attract an enormous number of followers. Reasons for this included the cultural revolution of the Harlem Renaissance, the large number of West Indians who immigrated to New York, and the appeal of the slogan "One Aim, One God, One Destiny."

Garvey also established the business, *The Negro Factories Corporation*. He planned to develop the businesses to manufacture every marketable commodity in every big U.S. industrial center, as well as in Central America, the West Indies, and Africa. Related endeavors included a grocery chain, restaurant, publishing house, and other businesses.

Convinced that black people should have a permanent homeland in Africa, Garvey sought to develop Liberia. It had been founded by the American Colonization Society in the 19th century as a colony for free blacks from the United States. Garvey launched the Liberia program in 1920, intended to build colleges, industrial plants, and railroads as part of an industrial base from which to operate. He abandoned the program in the mid-1920s after much opposition from European powers with interests in Liberia.

The UNIA held an international convention in 1921 at New York's Madison Square Garden. Also represented at the convention were organizations such as the Universal Black Cross Nurses, the Black Eagle Flying Corps, and the Universal African Legion. Garvey attracted more than 50,000 people to the event and in his cause. The UNIA had 65,000 to 75,000 members paying dues to his support and funding. The national level of support in Jamaica helped Garvey to become one of the most influential leaders of the 20th century on the island.

In 1922, he married Amy Jacques Garvey, who was working as his Secretary General. They had two sons together: Marcus Mosiah Garvey, III (born 17 September 1930) and Julius Winston (born 1933). Amy Jacques Garvey played an important role in his career, and would become a lead worker in Garvey's movement.

Marcus Garvey and three other UNIA officials were charged with mail fraud involving the Black Star Line. In January 1922, after thousands of brochures had been mailed to supporters, Garvey was arrested on mail fraud.





The Legacy of Marcus Garvey 1887-1940

While on bail, he continued to maintain his innocence, travel, speak and organize the UNIA. On June 23, 1923, Garvey was convicted and sentenced to prison for five years. After numerous attempts at appeal were unsuccessful, he was taken into custody and began serving his sentence at the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary on February 8, 1925. Two days later, he penned his well known "First Message to the Negroes of the World from Atlanta Prison", wherein he made his famous proclamation: "Look for me in the whirlwind or the storm, look for me all around you, for, with God's grace, I shall come and bring with me countless millions of black slaves who have died in America and the West Indies and the millions in Africa to aid you in the fight for Liberty, Freedom and Life.

Upon his release in November 1927, Garvey was deported via New Orleans to Jamaica, where a large crowd met him at Orrett's Wharf in Kingston. Though the popularity of the UNIA diminished greatly following Garvey's expulsion, he nevertheless remained committed to his political ideals.

In 1928, Garvey travelled to Geneva to present the Petition of the Negro Race. This petition outlined the worldwide abuse of Africans to the League of Nations. In September 1929, he founded the People's Political Party (PPP), Jamaica's first modern political party, which focused on workers' rights, education, and aid to the poor.

Garvey continued his political activism and the work of UNIA in Jamaica, and then moved to London in 1935. But he did not command the same influence he had earlier. Garvey died in London on June 10, 1940, at the age of 52, having suffering several strokes. In 1964, his body was returned to Jamaica where he was declared the country's first national hero and re-interred him at a shrine in the National Heroes Park.

Garvey's memory is maintained in several locations in Africa. Nairobi, Kenya and Enugu, Nigeria have streets bearing his name, while the township of Khayelitsha, Cape Town, South Africa, put his name on an entire neighborhood. Yenagoa, Bayelsa State, Nigeria has a library named for him. A bust of Garvey was created and is on display at a park in the central region in Ghana, along with one of Martin Luther King.

"A people without the knowledge of their past history, origin and culture is like a tree without roots."

"Liberate the minds of men and ultimately you will liberate the bodies of men."

Kwame Nkrumah named the national shipping line of Ghana the Black Star Line in honor of Marcus Garvey and the UNIA. Nkrumah also named the national soccer team the Black Stars as well. The black star at the center of Ghana's flag is also inspired by the Black Star.

ABOUT LIBERIA

Liberia is a country in West Africa along the coast of the North Atlantic ocean. Liberia has two stories and unique histories. First it is a land of immigrants dating back as far as the 11th century. As many tribal and ethnic groups arrived in small numbers. The culture of the Native inhabitants is somewhat different than other African kingdoms that had large states and empires, Most Liberian tribes lived in isolation from each other and did some trade. The coast of Liberia was called the Grain Coast and it was a source of exotic peppers and spices for European merchants. Because Liberia did not have any trade routes to the interior no large scale slave trade existed to justify building slave castles as what happened along the rest of the African coast.

The coming of the returning Africans....After 200 years in America the descendants of the Africans living in America found themselves in a dangerous hostile environment. The idea of returning to Africa was as old as the first Africans who were enslaved in America and the West. The problem was the cost and logistics involved. Many saw an opportunity to spread civilization to what was called the dark continent. Some were interested in being free from White racism and the humiliation of being Black in a White world. Many Whites saw the growing number of free blacks as a threat to the future of the White Manifest Destiny or making America a refuge for European immigrants.

Others thought that free educated Blacks threatened the institution of slavery. In the 1800's wealthy African American shipping Captain Paul Cuffee sent a group of free Black people to Freetown in British Sierra Leone. He was frustrated with the looming racism in America as Black people had no rights or citizenship. His venture was successful but he died after the first voyage. A friend of his Richard Findley took up his cause to prominent White Americans and many abolitionist about establishing a settlement in West Africa. This is when the idea of Liberia was born. The movement met with strong opposition from the free men of color in Philadelphia who denounced it as a plot to strengthen slavery. Nevertheless in 1820 the ship Elizabeth sailed from New York and landed in Sierra leone where they were forbidden by the British colonial administration to settle. So after two years the sailed down the coast and after treaties negotiation they landed on Providence Island in 1822.

ABOUT LIBERIA



Modern Liberia is a country of about five million people. Forty three thousand square miles with a rocky coast that made it difficult to invade. Liberian coastline is almost five hundred miles long with Sierra leone to the north and Ivory Coast to the south. Monrovia is the capital and has almost two million residents. Liberia has sixteen counties. Liberia is a recovering nation after fourteen years of uncivil war and chaos.

Liberian economy...In the 1960's Liberia had the fastest growing economy in the world. It had no external debts. Liberia was the first Black country to have major investment. In 1960 the Bong Mines was the largest investment on the continent. It made Liberia a major producer of iron ore to the industrialized world. This along with Firestone rubber made Liberia an important player in the global economy. Today Liberia is focusing of agriculture as well as other commodities for export.

Challenges in Liberia. There were two groups making up Liberia. The local inhabitants often called Natives and the Americo Liberians Much of the tensions were instigated by outside forces and intermarriage between the two groups was common. The term Americo Liberian was never used in Liberia. People from America the Caribbean and other parts of Africa were called Congos or Congo people. Over the years Liberia has become a melting pot of Black African cultures religions and ideas. In 2022 the entire country celebrated the coming of the first African Americans in the bicentennial celebration. As we take this journey we are reconnecting with a country whose constitution was specifically written for any of our people who wanted to return to Africa and live in peace and serenity.

- People are very friendly! However, be wary of people who just want to make quick money off you and make promises they cannot keep. You should know as much as possible about the people you are planning to do business with.
- Please focus on enjoying yourself and accomplishing your mission. Do
 not get distracted by others or get caught up in complaining. This is an
 experience that will have its ups and downs; it's a part of your introduction
 to Africa. We recommend you go with the flow and enjoy your time in
 paradise around the wonderful itinerary that we have put together on this
 Journey of a Lifetime.
- When you visit do not come with a romanticized notion about Africa or you will be disappointed and unnecessarily frustrated. Come with open eyes and an open mind, knowing that we are in developing nations. There is much to do and we can be a positive and contributory part of it. Keep in mind that Africa is not America or Europe, nor do we want it to be. We are Mother Africa's children returning home and we want to be part of Mother Africa's growth and development.
- You can give additional tips to anyone who gives you great services or whoever you choose. The tips collected for hospitality services that will be provided in Africa is basic tips for all Africa staff including drivers, Guides at all sites, Hotel staff, and Entertainment. All other services that may be provided on this tour are a tip, depending on the situation, based on the services you get.
- During long trips, use rest room at hotels and, rest room stops. Limit liquid drinking on the bus. In case of emergency, notify the tour guide, so he can tell the driver to stop the bus ASAP.
- No outburst or distraction in group setting. If you need to talk about something let a staff member know.
- Please do not interrupt others from enjoying their journey.
- The last 2 days are light on the itinerary. Use the itinerary as a detailed reminder of the schedule including check out time, baggage arrangements, meals and airport departure.
- Participate in group pictures when we give the call, organize as best as possible, to make sure we have good group pictures of our journey.
- This is a very cultural and spiritual journey; please keep all negative energy away. Focus on the blessings of being on a beautiful journey in Africa.

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
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Bomani Tyehimba

Hello Family my name is Dwayne Makala aka The Kalagenesis/Culture Critic/ Geopolitical Pundit. For the last 35 years, I've been a huge historian of African history, and I specialize in unknown and hidden history. Such passion led me to the story of Liberia. Until now a strangely unknown place in the discussion of Black history. I believe Liberia is the missing piece of African American history. In 2011 after years of research, I was convinced that Liberia needed to be known. So, in 2011, I founded the Association of African Americans for Liberia. It is based on the real-life exodus of 1878 from Charleston SC to Liberia aboard the ship the Azor.

So, coming to Liberia is continuing the pioneering spirit of Black explorers' adventurers, and settlers to Africa which is over 200 years old. That's almost as long as the Atlantic Slave trade. So, on this trip, you will see 19th century Liberia brought to life and you will fall in love with Liberia. Behold! The Promised Land.

Wainie Goe-Ahmed also known as Wainey Wonder, is an inventive & versatile Liberian-American Director, Producer, Writer, Dancer, Entrepreneur, and Recruitment Agent who has been making a name for herself in the African Diasporan Entertainment Industry since 2001.

Born in Washington, DC (10th May 1983) she is the daughter of former Liberian diplomat Boniface Goe and Ghanaian housekeeper of Liberian descent Elizabeth Teah. The 3rd child of Elizabeth Teah and Boniface Goe's union. Wainie's upbringing was unique, both parents were well-traveled PanAfricanists who only emigrated to the United States in the 1970s to further their education and complete a working assignment until the

Liberian Civil War started and derailed their plans of ever moving back to Liberia as a family again. Once the war entered Liberia, the "Liberian Dream" as Wainie once used to call it as a child, was put on hold, until the foreseeable future. In 2004 at the end of the war, Wainie GoeAhmed decided to travel to Liberia and see if her dream still existed. Always hopeful she saw what others in the country could not see but hoped to instill through public outreach, business ventures, and education.

After 2010 the world became more focused on Africa and its potential, Wainie Goe-Ahmed always noticed Liberia was always left out as if the world wanted to erase our glorious past. After a visit to the country in 2010 Goe-Ahmed saw a great improvement in terms of infrastructure in the country since the ending of the war, in 2004 when she last visited.

In 2020 during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, Goe-Ahmed a Nurse by profession decided to split up her time equally between her professional career in the medical field and as a business entrepreneur to start Prospectz Entertainment in Liberia.

With Prospectz Entertainment Goe-Ahmed has been able to raise the standard of Media & Film Production in Liberia. By offering modern film equipment, technological resources, and training for her staff in Liberia. In 2020 Wainie Goe-Ahmed has also officially registered her organization The Liberian Heritage Society.



- Do maintain an open mind.
- Secure your money properly and be aware of pickpockets in crowded places.
- Do greet others before requesting any service.
- Do remember that it takes longer to move a group than an individual, so be patient.

Don'ts

Montserrado County is a county in the northwestern portion of the West African nation of Liberia containing its national capital, Monrovia. One of 15 counties that comprise the first-level of administrative division in the nation, it has 17 sub political districts. As of the 2022 Census, it had a population of 1,920,914, making it the most populous county in Liberia. The area of the county measures 738.5 square miles (1,913 km²), the smallest in the country. Bensonville serves as the capital. Created in 1847 at the foundation of the Liberian republic, the county is the oldest in Liberia. Montserrado's County Superintendent is Nyenekon Beauty Snoh-Barcon. The county is bordered by Bomi County to the west, Bong County to the north, and Margibi County to the east. The southern part of Montserrado lies on the Atlantic Coast.

Careysburg District and Todee District are the two statutorily created districts in the county. Commonwealth District, Greater Monrovia District and St. Paul River District are also recognized, but are not officially recognized as administrative districts. There are 21 townships, seven cities, one borough, and two chiefdoms contained within these districts. Administration varies by subunit with a governor running the borough, mayors in charge of cities, commissioners administering townships, and superintendents controlling districts.


Montserrado is the smallest county by size, but largest by population comprising approximately 33% of Liberia's total population. The population density is 599.7 inhabitants per square kilometre (1,553/sq mi), the highest in Liberia. The county had a population of 491,078 at the 1984 Census. The average household size was 4.7 people, a decrease from 5.4 at the 1984 Census. The county capital of Bensonville has a population of 4,089.



CAPITAL HILL LIBERIA



Monrovia is the capital city of the West African country of Liberia. Founded in 1822, it is located on Cape Mesurado on the Atlantic coast and as of the 2022 census had 1,761,032 residents, home to 33.5% of Liberia's total population. Its Metro Area including Montserrado and Margibi counties largely being urbanized, was home to 2,225,911 inhabitants as of the 2022 census. As the nation's primate city, Monrovia is the country's economic, financial and cultural center; its economy is primarily centered on its harbor and its role as the seat of Liberian government.

What Type Of Government Does Liberia Have? Currently, Liberia is transitioning from dictatorship to democracy. Today, the country is a presidential representative democratic republic where the President is both the head of government and the state. The country has a multi-party system. The government, comprising of the President and the other ministers, carry out the executive duties. The legislative power is vested in both the cabinet and the bicameral legislature of Liberia. The judiciary is a separate wing independent of the executive and legislative branches of the government.

Monrovia is situated in the district of Greater Monrovia in Montserrado County. Instead of being divided into clans like other districts of Liberia, Greater Monrovia is divided into 16 "zones". Like clans, these zones are subdivided into 161 communities. Greater Monrovia does not have an organized district administration like other districts, with all lower-level local authorities being directly supervised by the Montserrado County Superintendent. Municipally, Greater Monrovia District is subdivided into two city corporations and ten other local authorities (nine townships and one borough).

FREEPORT OF MONROVIA



The Freeport of Monrovia is the main commercial port facility in the West African nation of Liberia. It was artificially created on Bushrod Island near Monrovia in 1948. The facility contains four piers and one main wharf with four berths. The port also has tanker facilities and a fishery pier. The National Port Authority operates it.

As early as 1850, seagoing ships began exporting palm oil from a port at Monrovia. During World War II, the United States Armed Forces landed in Liberia to ensure the flow of rubber exports for use in wartime materials. These forces improved the port facilities in Monrovia and built an artificial harbor with two breakwaters. In 1948, this new 750 acres (3.0 km²) bay opened.

The national government took over the port from an American company in 1971 and created the National Port Authority to operate the facility. A strike in 1981 crippled the port for a month before the President of Liberia dismissed the strikers. In 1990, during the First Liberian Civil War, President Samuel Doe was captured at the port by Prince Johnson and later executed elsewhere.

In 1995, the M/V *Mush* sank after being overloaded and hindered port traffic until removed in 1998. On July 25, 2001, the M/V *Torm Alexandra* sunk at the port, blocking one of the berths. After years of failed efforts to remove the ship, the ship was raised and removed in a private operation financed by the United States government in May 2009. In 2002, the port authority completed dredging the harbor's entrance to allow for second and third generation vessels to visit.

LIBERIA NATIONAL MUSEUM



The National Museum of Liberia is a national museum in Monrovia, Liberia. Initially housed in the First Executive Mansion on Ashmun Street of the city which is now used as a library, it was established by an Act of the National Legislature in 1958 under the administration of Liberia's 18th President, Dr William V.S. Tubman. Partly funded by UNESCO, in coordination with the Department of Public instructions (what is now the Liberian Ministry of Education), its primary goal was to obtain, preserve and display cultural artefacts and other historical items which depict the country's heritage.

The museum remained under the Department of Public Instructions until 1965 when it became the responsibility of the Department of Information, Cultural Affairs and Tourism. In 1981 this detached to form the National Bureau of Culture & Tourism of which the museum operated under through much of the 1980s until June 1987 when it was dissolved and returned to the control of the Department of Information. In 1972, the museum was relocated to a new building on Providence Island but four years later this building was removed to facilitate the construction of the People's Bridge over the Mesurado River.

It was later moved to the Old Supreme Court building and formally reopened on July 25, 1987 with a ceremony given by the Vice President of Liberia, Harry F. Moniba.

The museum is classified in three tiers, where on the ground floor there is a hypsographical gallery containing presidential papers, private documents and memoirs of past important executives of the Liberian government and photographs and cartographical resources related to its culture. On display is the nation's first flag dating back to August 1847. There are also other items ranging from postage stamps to an editorial page of Liberia's daily newspaper, the Liberia Herald. Other items include traditional Liberian household furniture and utensils, and there is a craft shop run by the African Arts & Crafts Inc.

PROVIDENCE ISLAND TOUR



Providence Island, formerly known as Dozoa, is located approximately 500 - 600 meters away from the bar mouth of the Atlantic Ocean. The Island has both hydrological and geophysical characteristics that define the western fling of the Mesurado or Doo River. The island has sparsely distributed mangrove swamps at its south-eastern end. Providence Island, from an aerial view present a geophysical shape of a guitar with a land mass of 11.22 acres surrounded by the Mesurado River and Stockton creek

Providence Island is a former trade post and the first arrival point of freed African diasporans returning to the land of the ancestors. The site is characterized by a cement pillar and concrete floor believed to be the `first Concrete work in the history of the country, an ancient water well and an old landing docking platform for incoming canoes and ships. The rusted heavy steel bar of the dock are partly buried into the Mesurado river today. In addition to these elements, is the oldest cotton tree, (250) years according to history of the State.

The site is of historical and cultural significance in the history of West Africa as the Island was one of the first places freed slaves landed on January 1, 1822. They were the second batch of Repatriated Africans who returned to their father's land from America in 1820 and subsequently created the nation known today as Liberia. As an island it bears testimony to the reversal of the "no point of return" when slaves were forcible taken to the Americas with no prospect of coming back. Providence Island, originally known as Dozoa meaning "Land in the center of water (Gola`Vernacular) defines Liberia's origin as a nation, including the cultural diversity that is visible in the country. Before the arrival of first batch of African returnees from the Americas, Providence Island was a major trade post for both Portuguese and ethnics of the land.

JOSEPH J ROBERTS FIRST PRESIDENT OF LIBERIA



Joseph Jenkins Roberts (born March 15, 1809, Petersburg, Va., U.S.—died Feb. 24, 1876, Monrovia, Liberia) American-born, first president of Liberia (1848 –56). A native of Virginia, Roberts was the son of free "blacks" whose heritage was more than seven-eighths white. At the age of 20 he immigrated to Liberia with his mother and younger brothers, became a merchant, and also became an unofficial aide to the white governor of the colony, Thomas H. Buchanan, a member of the American Colonization Society, which sought the return of American freedmen to Africa. On Buchanan's death in 1842, Roberts was appointed the first black governor of the colony.

In efforts to establish the political and economic stability of the colony, Roberts and other colonists sought treaties with native tribes and recognition from foreign powers. In 1847 they proclaimed the new republic of Liberia; Roberts was elected the first president. In 1849, during a visit to England, he secured British recognition of Liberia as a sovereign nation; and in 1852, in another trip to continental Europe, he acquired recognition from other powers.

UNIVERSITY OF LIBERIA



The **University of Liberia** (**UL** or LU in older versions of abbreviation) is a publicly funded institution of higher learning located in Monrovia, Liberia. Authorized by the national government in 1851, the university opened in 1862 as Liberia College. UL has four campuses: the Capitol Hill Campus in Monrovia, the Fendall campus in Louisiana, outside Monrovia, the Medical School Campus in Congo Town, and the Straz-Sinje Campus in Sinje Grand Cape Mount County. The university enrolls approximately 18,000 students and is one of the oldest institutions of higher learning in West Africa. It is accredited by the Liberian Commission on Higher Education.



In 1847, Liberia declared independence from the American Colonization Society. In 1851, the new national legislature authorized the creation of a state college and chartered Liberia College. Financing was provided by the New York Colonization Society and the Trustees of Donations for Education in Liberia, both United States organizations. These two groups provided almost all of the funds for the school during the 19th century and were responsible for hiring the faculty.

TOUR SITES

Grand Cape Mount County

The consistent, high-quality waves draw surfers from around the world, making it a must-visit destination for surfers of any level. This small fishing village also provides the most beautiful stretches of beach for sun and water lovers. Nana's Lodge, Vartilda's Guesthouse, Philip's Guesthouse, and the Robertsport Surf Club are among the accommodation options right by the beach. Robertsport is three to five hours from Monrovia, depending on road conditions, making it an excellent destination for a weekend or week-long adventure.

Visitors will be captivated by the stunning scenery of Lake Piso Multi-Use Reserve, which contains Liberia's largest lake, Lake Piso, and the humid wetlands surrounding it. But the real magic of Grand Cape Mount County lies in its people, known for their warmth and hospitality. Experience traditional dances, go fishing in a traditional fishing boat on Lake Piso, and immerse yourself in the local way of life.

GOLA KISSI VILLAGE - LAKE PISO - ROROBERTSPORT



Gola Kissi Village, nestled in Robertsport, Liberia, is a captivating locale with a rich history and natural beauty. Most of the Gola live in western Liberia, primarily in the districts of Lofa, Grand Cape Mount, Bomi, and Montserrando. Nearly nine thousand others live in the neighboring country of Sierra Leone, where they are concentrated in the small provinces of Kenema and Pujehun. The Gola speak a Niger-Congo language, also called Gola, that is closely related to the language of the Kissi. Gola and Kissi migrations into western Liberia began as early as the 1300s, when they left their homes in the Ivory Coast and beyond. During that time, much of what is now Sierra Leone and Liberia was uninhabited, tropical rain forests. Since that time, a large portion of the land has been cleared for cultivation. Today, the Gola of Liberia and Sierra Leone are skilled farmers.

Robertsport lies on the Cape Mount peninsula, approximately 10 miles (16 km) from the border with Sierra Leone. The town is named after Joseph Jenkins Roberts, Liberia's first president. It occupies a narrow strip of land that separates the brackish lagoon Lake Piso from the Atlantic Ocean. Robertsport is situated about 50 miles (80 km) northwest of Monrovia, the capital of Liberia. The town lies on Cape Mount peninsula, a spit of land separating the brackish lagoon Lake Piso from the Atlantic Ocean, 50 mi (80 km) north-west of Monrovia. It serves as the capital of Grand Cape Mount County and is the home of the city corporation.

Lake Piso, also known as Lake Pisu and Fisherman's Lake, is an oblong tidal lagoon in Grand Cape Mount County in western Liberia, near the town of Robertsport. At an area of 103 km² (40 sq mi), it is the largest lake in Liberia. Its name originates from a local term meaning "pigeon's hole" – a reference to the flocks of pigeons that once came to Lake Piso for water. The nearest town to Lake Piso is Robertsport which is located exactly at the confluence of the Atlantic Ocean and the lake itself. With a total area of 103 square km (40 square mi), it is the largest lake in the West African country that is fed not just from the Atlantic, but from Maffa, Moffe and Mawua rivers too.

CASABLANCA, MOROCCO



Morocco, officially the **Kingdom of Morocco**, is a country in the Maghreb region of North Africa. It overlooks the Mediterranean Sea to the north and the Atlantic Ocean to the west, and has land borders with Algeria to the east, and the disputed territory of Western Sahara to the south. Morocco also claims the Spanish exclaves of Ceuta, Melilla and Peñón de Vélez de la Gomera, and several small Spanish-controlled islands off its coast. It has a population of roughly 37 million, the official and predominant religion is Islam, and the official languages are Arabic and Berber; French and the Moroccan dialect of Arabic are also widely spoken. Moroccan identity and culture is a mix of Arab, Berber, African and European cultures. Its capital is Rabat, while its largest city is Casablanca.

Since independence, Morocco has remained relatively stable. It has the fifth-largest economy in Africa and wields significant influence in both Africa and the Arab world; it is considered a middle power in global affairs and holds membership in the Arab League, the Arab Maghreb Union, the Union for the Mediterranean, and the African Union. Morocco is a unitary semi-constitutional monarchy with an elected parliament.

Casablanca is a captivating city with a wealth of intriguing secrets and fascinating tales. Do you know that Casablanca is Morocco's largest city and economic powerhouse? CASABLANCA TOUR SITES



Mohammed V Square is a public square of historical and symbolic significance located in central Casablanca, Morocco. It was established in 1916 at the beginning of the French protectorate in Morocco under Resident-general Hubert Lyautey, on a design by architects Henri Prost and Joseph Marrast. The square is the heart of the administrative district of Casablanca and is home to many of the city's important official buildings, including the main post office, Palace of Justice, Prefecture, French consulate, and the main Bank of Morocco.



In the 1980's, the city of Casablanca was not as replete with historical monuments as it is today. Then the king of Morocco decided this needs to be changed and hired a French architect and some 6000 laborers to build the 7th largest mosque of the world and the largest of the country. With a capacity to accommodate over 25,000 worshippers within the walls of the mosque and 80,000 outside, the minaret of the mosque stands tall 690 feet from the ground. On top of this minaret, shines a light in the direct of Mecca. The best way to get around the mosque is to opt for the hour long guided tour.

The 7th largest mosque in the world, **the Hassan ii Mosque** is one of the prime destinations as you visit Casablanca. 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

Well, how can you have an "Afrika town" if you don't have an Afrika?



The BAIO is not a "Back to Afrika" movement.





Site Map above is an overview of our projected layout for our future community for phase 1. The community will be built in 2 phases or more based on future demands. Phase 1 entails 60 plots on 15 acres. The residential & commercial plots on both phases are 80 ft x 100 ft lots for a total of 8,000 square feet per plot. We plan to use 10 remaining plots for a park, community center, business center, and security post.

Phase 2 will include 240plots on 60 acres for residential and business projects. This will include 30 plots for farming, 120 plots for residential, 24 plots for Apartments/Condos, 28 plots for onsite commercial investment, 4 plots for a community store, 4 plots for a Medical Center, 4 plots for an Educational/Training Building, 4 plots for a Maintenance Facility, 8 plots for an additional community and business center.

Black Star Repatriation & Pan-African Community, in Central Region is located in the town Gyaahadze. It gives you access to a nice clean beach two miles from the property. It is two miles away from the city of Winneba, and about three miles away from the Accra/Winneba Rd which takes you to Cape Coast to the left or Accra to the right. The community land is in the middle of Cape Coast and Accra. The land is 1.5 to 2 hours away from either city based on traffic.

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



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


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
